VFW District 10 Virginia - Puller Veterans Care Center Breaks Ground

VINCENT HILL, VA -

Just a few decades ago, Vint Hill Farms was home to thousands of military people and their families. Today, a 30-acre section of the property is taking on a new life as a future home for Virginia's veterans.

The new facility, slated to open in 2019-20 timeframe, is on a site that was home to an Army intelligencegathering station until it closed in 1997. The \$48-

million Veterans Care Center is named after the Puller family, which has deep roots in the Northern Virginia area, including famed U.S. Marine Gen. Lewis "Chesty" Puller; his wife, retired state Sen. Linda "Toddy" Puller; and his son, Marine Lt. Lewis Puller, Jr.

On October 29th, Gov. Terry McAuliffe and a host of other elected leaders picked up their shovels to break ground on the Puller Veterans

Care Center, formally kicking off construction on a 128-bed facility for recovering veterans at the intersection of Vint Hill Road and Vint Hill Parkway in Warrenton.

Del. Rich Anderson, 51st District, Life Member of the VFW, and a vocal backer of veterans issues, teamed up with Del. Kirk Cox, 66th District, to sponsor legislation to allocate funding for the centers. Meanwhile, Toddy Puller hercould soon settle in the area. "As Vint Hill develops, they can live, work and shop all through this area," Lingamfelter said. "It's just the perfect setting...and it shows that Virginia is not going to leave its veterans behind.

VFW District 10 Virginia - USAF Chief of Staff Speaks at Ceremony

QUANTICO NATIONAL CEMETARY, VA - On Veterans Day, November 11th, General David Goldfein, US Air Force Chief of Staff, honored our veterans with his keynote speech at the National Veterans Day Ceremony, held since 1983.

The Chairman, Potomac Region Veterans Council (PRVC) , and Commander of VFW District 10, Chuck Wilson, Colonel, USAF (Ret), was the Master of Ceremonies. Wilson said, "for generations, the men and women of America's Armed Forc-



es have demonstrated their willingness to put country before self ... patriots who serve for the greater good ... who don't seek glory or recognition or personal gain. And today, we honor them. Today is Veterans' Day."

PRVC Vice Chairman Randy Coker, led the "Avenue of Honor Recognition" which displays over 500 US Flags that have been donated to honor our veterans who have passed from our midst. Coker is the past Commander of VFW Post I503 and currently Senior Vice Commander of VFW District 10, Virginia's largest District covering much of Northern Virginia.



KANSAS CITY, MO (November 7, 2017) – The Veterans of Foreign Wars of the U.S. has been awarded a Wounded Warrior Project[®] (WWP) financial grant in the amount of \$443,145 to expand its reach to service members at the time of transition. The grant will be applied to the VFW's Pre-Discharge claims program, which offers free assistance on military installations across the country to transitioning service members and veterans in filing VA claims, and understanding the benefits available to them through the Department of Veterans Affairs.

"One of the VFW's top priorities is ensuring our returning military service personnel receive the benefits they've earned," said VFW National Commander Keith E. Harman, a retired county veterans' service officer.

"We're thankful for the continued support shown by Wounded Warrior Project. With 24 Pre-Discharge claims offices across the country, this grant helps ensure the VFW is able to continue to provide the guidance and assistance our transitioning service members deserve." The VFW Pre-Discharge claims program's proven history of guiding military personnel through the complex VA claims process makes it well-deserving of such a large charitable investment. In 2016, VFW representatives on military installations helped file nearly 15,400 VA claims for transitioning service members and veterans.

WWP grants provide a network of comprehensive supportive services that meet the varying needs of warriors and family members. The organization places a priority on working with others to harness subject matter expertise to reach a greater number of injured veterans, having teamed up with 93 organizations, reaching more than 14,000 veterans and 3,000 family members since 2012. 承

VFW National - Vietnam Veterans Memorial Turns 35

WASHINGTON, D.C. -

The Vietnam Veterans Memorial, more popularly known as "The Wall", was dedicated 35 years ago on Nov. 13, 1982. Since then, more than 100 million people have visited the iconic structure, according to Jan Scruggs, founder of the Vietnam Veterans Memorial Fund. The National Parks Ser-

vice noted that nearly 5.6 million people visited in 2016, making it the nation's second-most popular memorial or monument.

Donations from more than 275K individuals and entities paid for the wall's construction. VFW contributed



more than \$300,000 and was one of its earliest champions.

Scruggs, a Vietnam War veteran and member of VFW Post 341 in Washington, D.C., said VFW "never wavered" in its support of The Wall when other organizations were against its design.
